## What is this LENT thing anyway?

LENT is the Christian season of repentance, a sort of spring-cleaning of our lives that calls us to renew our faith in Jesus Christ. It reminds us of Jesus' 40 day fast in the wilderness. We may practise these things:

**FASTING**, which is giving up something (not necessarily food) to remind us of our dependence on God and Jesus' sacrifice for us.

**PRAYING** to grow closer to God and asking forgiveness for where we have fallen short of His hope for our lives. We also ask God to help others and show us how we can be part of His work.

**GIVING** is sharing with others some of the talents, time and resources that God has given to us by following Jesus' example. Some of us may volunteer or make a gift to a charity.

**WEEK1 (1 – 7 Mar)** Lord, as we enter Lent help us to draw near to you in praise, stripping away all that distracts us from worship. **Amen** 

**WEEK 2 (8 – 14 Mar)** As Jesus resisted temptation by the devil in the wilderness, help us reflect on his faithfulness to God, his rejection of worldly values and hold these thoughts in our hearts throughout Lent and beyond. **Amen** 

**WEEK 3 (15 – 21 Mar)** Jesus, you prayed and fasted. As your disciple teach me about spiritual discipline in my relationship with you. **Amen** 

**WEEK 4 (22 – 28 Mar)** Lord may Lent be a time of inward searching that makes me more able to look with compassion at the needs of the world. **Amen** 

**WEEK 5 (29 Mar – 4 Apr)** Thank you Lord for desert experiences, when being confronted with myself makes me realise my need of you. **Amen** 

**WEEK 6 (5 – 11 Apr)** Lord, you've guided us through the difficult days of Lent, encouraging us along the way. We pray as we move towards the darkest day, thatyou'll not forsake us but remind us of our Saviour's ultimate gift and promise of new, abundant, eternal life for all who believe and trust in him, your precious son, Jesus. **Amen**

# John Wesley in Prudhoe

**John Wesley** never specifically mentions having preached at Prudhoe, although he visited the North-East many times. The only reference to the town in his *Journal* is this entry dated 21 June 1759.



I preached at Nafferton at one. As I was riding thence, one stopped me on the road and said, "Sir, do you not remember, when you were at Prudhoe two years since, and you breakfasted at Thomas Newton's? I am his sister. You looked upon me as you were going out, and said, 'Be in earnest.' I knew not then what earnestness meant, nor had any thought about it; but the words sank into my heart, so that I could never rest any more till I sought and found Christ."

The entry shows that Wesley's preaching had some effect. Sound preaching still does!

#### JOHN WESLEY SPARKS A FLAME... METHODISM COMES TO PRUDHOE (Part 1)

A stone on South Road in the wall of Prudhoe House (once the meeting place of Prudhoe Council) marks the place where John Wesley preached during his first visit to Prudhoe on 27th June 1757.

It is surprising to note that he began his preaching there at five o'clock in the morning! This was so he could catch the workmen on their way to the fields, since Prudhoe was purely an agricultural village at the time. After this early start, Wesley took breakfast with Thomas Newton at Prudhoe Hall Farm.

It was on a plot purchased for a nominal sum of five shillings from Squire Anthony Humble of Prudhoe House that Prudhoe's first Methodist Church was built in 1757. It is said that Wesley himself staked out the site behind South Road, just above the Locomotive Inn. This chapel is marked on the 1859 map. Apparently, John Wesley preached in Prudhoe on four occasions.






