

### Tony writes ...



I've often said that God has a funny sense Back in the 1990s, I almost of humour. became superintendent minister of the Ryton and Prudhoe Circuit. happen: the circuit invited Neil Cockling, and I went off to do my 'overseas missions' in Yorkshire. Quite a few years later I came back to Hexham in 'retirement', by which time Prudhoe was part of the same circuit, SO you never had me superintendent but you've had me to preach

quite a few times as a supernumerary, and now for a couple of months, you've got me as your minister while Jenny gets settled into being the superintendent and we await the arrival of Fiona from South Africa.

And God grinned! Whether he was determined to let you experience me as a minister, or whether he wanted me to experience you as a church, the bits have finally fallen into place, and in July and August I will be doing pastoral visiting and preaching - and knowing you as I do from my visits over the last few years, I am looking forward to it.

You will notice I put the word 'retirement' in quotes. Technically, Methodist ministers do not 'retire'; that's a word we don't use, we talk about 'sitting down' from our years of travelling. Of course, we often find we're 'sitting down' in a driving seat - the call to preach, the gifts of ministry, the things that have driven us for the years of active ministry, they don't go away just because we're now on a pension. I felt when I 'retired' - sorry, 'sat down' - I'd been set free from the busy-ness of being a superintendent, set free from things like church councils and committees and stuff, free to do the things I really feel called to do, like preach, teach, and care for people. From 'superintendent' to 'supernumerary': not sure if that makes me some kind of 'superev', or if I need to dash into a phone box and come out wearing a cape and clerical shirt with a big S on the front! Actually, far from being 'super', I often feel the most important gift God gives to us is being able to be 'ordinary' - I grew up on a large council estate in North Shields, I live in an ordinary street among ordinary people, I'm a husband, dad, and grandad, I've been through the same happy times and hard times as most other people. The gift is to see God in that very special ordinary life, to follow Jesus and try to help other people follow him. I hope we'll do that together over the next few months. I'm sure it will be super!

#### A Story of Influence - as told by Allan Waters

Coughs and sneezes spread diseases. When I was a young lad it seems to me that this was the mantra at home, in school and even on posters put up by the government. This has been replaced by keep your distance, wear a face mask, catch it, bin it, kill it, and sanitise. In the early stages of the Covid outbreak we were told the symptoms were "flu like" or to give it its proper name "influenza like", and all those people who had it, caught it from someone else.

The word "influenza" comes from the Italian word that means "a flowing out of one life to another." It doesn't tell us anything about the illness itself only that it is catching. Nobody that I have talked to, even those with mild symptoms of Covid, has enjoyed the experience, being confined to bed for many days, much less the knowledge that so many have had to go on respirators or have succumbed to this terrible illness. No it's not good and it's catching and as we have been told recently Covid has not gone away. Our word "influence" comes from the same source as the Italian word because it flows out of one person to another; influence however can be good as well as bad.

The story is told of a young boy, just after the end of the Second World War, called Jonny who was eleven. He was leaving the Primary School with a bad attendance record. His parents were fined for his truancy on more than one occasion. When the local magistrate heard that Jonny was going to the Secondary School the next term he said that he hoped it would help Jonny not to truant again. And so it seemed. All the first term Jonny was a regular attendee. So many new things to do, visits out of school, weekly trips to the public swimming baths, experiments in the laboratory to do himself and the excitement of the woodwork and metalwork shops and the art studios, all kept him busy and happy. Then one day in the second term he forgot to do some homework and instead of coming to school and explaining to the teacher, he fell into his old ways and didn't go to school. This continued for several days and Jonny was fed up as he had no one to play with, so one afternoon he spoke with one of his classmates called Tom and told him how much better it was in the park than in school, and how he had skipped school so many times in the past and hadn't had to suffer for it.

So the next day Jonny had a friend with whom to help pass the time. After a week of walking about the park they got bored and played in some condemned houses. One day they found a locked cupboard and Jonny broke it open and took away scores of little toys in boxes which they had found there. As the toys were all the same they gave some away and sold others. The police noticing so many of these toys about began to inquire and so traced the toys back to Jonny. This offence "stealing by finding" brought Jonny and Tommy into court. The magistrate was disappointed that Jonny had not settled into his new school and sent him to an approved school.

Tom was put on probation and warned that he would follow Jonny if he did not improve his ways. But Tom had got a taste for adventure and continued to be troublesome. His headmaster was concerned for him and discovered that Tom had been friendly with a good lad named David before going astray with Jonny, so he asked David to win Tom's friendship back. This he did over several weeks, David invited Tom home for tea and introduced him to his pals at the youth club. Soon Tom found himself following David in all the good things that he did just as he had followed Jonny in all his bad deeds. Influence is catching, both good and bad. Many children are easily led. If they are influenced by a bad companion then this will lead them into trouble, but if they are influenced by good friends this leads to happiness.

The disciples were wise. Andrew was influenced by John the Baptist to follow Jesus. Andrew influenced his brother Peter to do the same and Philip influenced Nathanael to follow Jesus and their lives were transformed as they influenced many others. They were wise; they followed Jesus, one who was a great influence for good. If we are wise we will follow him too. When Paul wrote, "None of us lives to himself" he meant that everyone influences others for good or evil. Which sort of influence are you? If we let Christ influence us we shall influence others for good.

**Prayer;** Thank you Lord for all who are a good influence in our lives and help us to put Jesus first in our thoughts, words and actions so that we may be a good influence to others. Amen.

## Getting to Know you – Lynne Graham Adapted from her President Elect Talk on 17 March at PMC

The youngest of four I was brought up on a small holding. I learnt to love nature and music. Mam played piano, I had lessons for a couple of years, and dad was a violinist. I went to Sunday school, attended a dance class and sang "Me and my teddy bear" in a Panto when aged 5. I walked "The road to the Isles" on leaving school. After 2 years in a bank, I was a Lab.technician for Newcastle University at Close House, Wylam. I met Kevin at 18 and we went to our church youth fellowship in the home of Bill and Hazel Carrick. 52 years ago, when planning engagement at 20, my boss suggested marriage as there was a vacant flat at Close House, so why wait?

We had Kay and Richard, thanking God for their safe arrival. We drifted a bit from church, but were brought back by Bill and Hazel through the drama group mostly doing Pantos. At the Billy Graham campaign in the early 80's Kay and I went forward, making a commitment to God. I became a member of this church in 1985. I started working at Prudhoe high school in the labs and stayed for over 14 years. I went to Taizé, with the maths teacher and some 6th form RE students. 7,000 young people on a French hillside with inspiring talks and wonderful singing. Brother Roger who started Taizé as a place of reconciliation, profoundly said"If our faith is as vital to us as our breath is to living, being attentive to others follows" that is, we should care for each other.

Through school I could access a sign language course so I could interpret worship songs. I joined a Christian dance group called "beyond the barricades", an inspiring, friendly mix of people. I've been to lona on a John Bell music week, staying in the abbey singing simple harmonies. I've done Alpha, Disciple, Ignite and visited World church camp in Cambridge, Spring harvest in Skegness and Cherish in Leeds, where 7.000 ladies worshipped and listened to God's word. It was suggested that if each person there gave £1 per month for a year, 12 charities would benefit with £7,000 each. Wow!!

I sang in our choir, helped at Youth club and have been a steward. I went to Cliff College on a Walk to Emmaus weekend in November 1997. What a weekend of teaching and love. That made me rethink my working life, that I should be working with people not instruments and solutions. In 1998, I left my school job to work with people with learning difficulties then went to Hexham hospital to work in the community, following stroke victims home, for rehab. In 2005 we had the first North east Walk to Emmaus retreat at Minsteracres and they continued for 10 more years. Our Emmaus reunion group meet monthly to encourage and challenge each other.

We made some good friends going for dance lessons, attending Saturday night dances and weekends away, with Blackpool being a highlight. We've had some fabulous holidays. I've prayer walked the length of the Tyne and done St.Oswald and St.Cuthberts way with lovely friends accompanying me each time.

Kevin and I visited the Epworth rectory a few years ago; the home of John and Charles Wesley, their mother Susanna. An exhibition leaflet said we should Believe the Gospel and behave it ... believe the Jesus stories and follow His example. Through MWiB I've been to Minsteracres and Swanwick retreats and heard some great speakers, meeting old & new friends. Through this church I joined the circuit band and Mike encouraged me to also join Prudhoe community band. When the circuit band finished, I joined Hexham brass. Both bands are a joy. Although not very good myself, together we make a nice sound and a privilege to play at our Sunday services.

Back to the Cherish Challenge, I'll tell you the starfish story. A man was walking on a beach that was covered with stranded starfish. There was a boy throwing them back into the sea one by one. "You're wasting your time" the man said, but the boy replied "I'm making a difference to those I can return to the sea". We all can make a difference.

Finally, I look forward to meeting more of you around the District. I'm not feeling qualified in speaking, but I know I will be enabled, equipped and encouraged to talk passionately about the charity that we will fund raise for. With God's help we can.
